Admission Policies And Procedures For Eyecare Assistant

Become a Certified Ophthalmic Assistant (COA)

The Vision Care Technician program will equip you with the skills needed to assist Ophthalmologists in a clinic setting and in the performance of minor surgical procedures.

Adult Program

Become a Certified Ophthalmic Assistant. This full-time program is a paid apprenticeship with only 350 class time hours and majority of this 1-year program completed on-site at Dean McGee Eye Institute as an employee.

High School Seniors

This 10-month program covers all coursework and lab experience required for future employment and certification as a Certified Ophthalmic Assistant. When students finish this program, they are ready for employment where they will complete required internship hours on-the-job to complete their certification.

Adult Enrollment Requirements:

• Accuplacer Assessment or documentation for Testing Waiver

- Accuplacer testing
 To be eligible for enrollment, the following Accuplacer scores are required: Reading 235 and Arithmetic 238
 Contact our assessment center at 405-422-2382 to schedule an appointment for testing. You will see a counselor the same day you test.
- Testing Waiver
 Applicants with any of the following do not need to take the Accuplacer test:
 - ACT of 19 or SAT of --- within the past 5 years
 - 12 hours of at least level 1 college credit within the past 5 years
 - Associate Degree within the past 5 years or Bachelors Degree

High School Diploma or GED required for enrollment as an adult.

Method of Payment

- CV Tech's Vision Care Technician program is a registered apprenticeship program with the U.S. Department of Labor. While enrolled in this program, students are paid employees of Dean McGee Eye Institute with benefits, including health insurance and a \$150 clothing allowance for scrubs. Dean McGee Eye Institute (DMEI) will also pay for tuition, fees and books for students who agree to work for the institute for two years after program completion.
 - This program does not qualify for Financial Aid (FAFSA) or Pell Grants
 - High school seniors attend free of charge.

Immunization Record

• Flu, Covid, and Hep B vaccinations are required by Dean McGee Eye Institute for students in the apprenticeship program. Hep B shots provided by DMEI if needed. COVID waivers available.

Application for Employment

- Once approved for enrollment, adult students will apply for employment with Dean McGee Eye Institute (DMEI) and go through an interview process.
 CV Tech offers assistance with resume writing, application completion, and interview skills.
- After the hiring process is completed, students will be able to start
 working with DMEI if they choose....even before they start class at CV
 Tech. When classes start, students will be at CV Tech in mornings and
 at DMEI in the afternoons for one semester, then at DMEI full time 2nd
 semester.
- As an apprentice, training is competency-based. This means each student has a checklist of professional skills they are working to master. Once each skill is mastered, it is checked off the list and the student is closer to completion and certification. If a student completes the list of competencies faster than expected, they are allowed to complete the program faster than expected. Once certified, employees get a pay raise at DMEI. Starting pay as a student/apprentice is around \$14/hr. Program completion takes about one year.

Frequently Asked Questions and Answers

1. What is the difference between a traditional program and an apprenticeship program?

<u>Traditional Program</u> – All students start and complete class at the same time. Students pay tuition based on time spent in class. Most of the training takes place in the classroom. Students are prepared for employment after completing the program. The traditional program is for high school students and classes meet 12:25-3:15, Monday-Friday.

Apprenticeship Program – Students are paid employees in the industry

while completing the training program. Most of the training takes place on-the-job. Completion times can vary from student to student depending on how quickly new skills are mastered. The apprenticeship program for adult students. Classes meet 8:25-11:15 and 12:25-4:30, Monday- Friday. Attendance is strictly enforced. Full-time enrollment only.

2. What certification can I earn through the Eyecare Assistant Program?

JCAHPO Certified Ophthalmic Assistant (COA) AHA BLS Provider, CPR, and First Aid

3. What is the average length of time in which students complete the program?

Adults – 1 calendar year High school seniors – 10 months

4. What is the dress code?

Students must wear scrubs every day (gray); you may wear a CV Tech t-shirt instead of a scrub top in class, but a full set of scrubs is required on the job. A sweatshirt (no hoodies) or jacket is allowed with a CV Tech short sleeve t-shirt under. Students must wear healthcare appropriate shoes (athletic, closed toe shoes that are clean and professional, no Croc type shoes). Long fingernails can interfere with completing the skills of a technician, please keep nails to a modest length; consider no more than a quarter of an inch beyond your fingertip.

5. Will I have to do a drug test?

Canadian Valley Technology Center is partnered with Dean McGee Eye Institute to provide apprenticeships for students in the Vision Care Technician Program. As employees of DMEI, students are expected to adhere to their employee drug testing policies.

6. What if I have to miss class?

Students who exceed the attendance policy may forfeit the opportunity to attend the remainder of the current semester and the following semester or be completely withdrawn from the program. Adult students may have employment terminated.
